Alex Gonzalez has been employed with the City of Covina since July 2006. As a Senior Management Analyst he is responsible for the management of the City of Covina Transportation Division. Prior to his employment with the City of Covina, Alex was employed as a manager in the restaurant industry with Mimi's Café and Coco's restaurants in the cities of Monrovia, Arcadia, City of Industry, Covina, and Los Angeles. In 2006 Alex received the Nesvold Award for best graduate paper from the Social Science Research and Instructional Council of the California State University System for a 2006 statistical study on variations in voting behavior due to attendance at religious services. In January 2007 he completed a study that measured the voter mobilization effects of ballot propositions related to moral issues. In March 2007 Alex organized and led an exit poll to gauge the effectiveness of the City of Covina's outreach to residents on a utility user's tax ballot measure.

Alex received his MPA from Cal Poly Pomona in 2008 and graduated as a member of Pi Alpha Alpha, the national public administration honor society. Alex's MPA thesis examined the effects of direct democracy at the local government level, specifically tax and expenditure limitations enacted by voters from 1978 to 2005, on municipal services and operations for 48 communities in Los Angeles County, California.
