CSU Channel Islands Parking Notice:

FREE PARKING is provided for all CSU parking permit holders, including digital permits. However, if you have a digital permit, you MUST stop by the CSUCI Public Safety department, which handles transportation and parking services, to receive a (free) complimentary all-day parking permit. Public Safety is located in Placer Hall directly adjacent to A1 Parking lot on Camarillo Street.

[Parking on campus is by permit only and is strictly enforced 24/7. Those individuals without a CSU parking permit wishing to park on campus must pay for a parking permit. If you don't have a permit from CSUCI or another CSU campus, you can also purchase a daily permit for \$6. Permit dispensers are located in Lots A1, A2 (adjacent to Broome Library, with limited spaces), A3, and A4. Keynote Speaker: Dr. Peter Nardi

Professor Emeritus of Sociology, Pitzer College

Dr. Peter Nardi is currently Professor Emeritus at Pitzer College, a member of the Claremont Colleges located in Claremont, California. Dr. Nardi majored in Sociology, with a minor in Media, at the University of Notre Dame, before completing an M.A. in Counseling Education from Colgate University. He received a Ph.D. in Sociology of Education from the University of Pennsylvania, minoring in Statistics & Methodology, and Social Psychology. His areas of expertise include Media, Sexuality, Men's Studies and Friendships. He was the recipient of the Haynes Foundation Faculty Research Award (1994), and the Rockefeller Foundation's Bellagio Study & Conference Center Fellow (1997).

Dr. Nardi has published extensively during his distinguished career, in both peer reviewed journals and mainstream media, including *Newsday* and a Skeptical Thinking column in the *Pacific Standard*. His books include *Gay Men's Friendships* (University of Chicago Press, 1999) and *Gay Masculinities* (Sage Publications, 2000). Dr. Nardi has also published methodology textbooks include *Interpreting Data: A Guide to Understanding Research* (Allyn & Bacon, 2006), *Critical Thinking: Tools for Evaluating Research* (University of California Press, 2017), and *Doing Survey Research: A Guide to Quantitative Research Methods*, available in the 4th edition (Routledge, 2018).

During his tenure at Pitzer College, Dr. Nardi served as Associate Dean of the Faculty (1995-1997, 2000-2004), Director of Institutional Research (2001-2008), and Acting President in spring of 2009. He was the Editor in Chief of *Sociological Perspectives* (1999-2003), and served as President of the Pacific Sociological Association (PSA) from 2005-2006.

Wireless Access for Guests of CSU Channel Islands

Guest Wireless Network Guide (CI_GUEST)

The CI_GUEST wireless network is a courtesy service available to campus guests.

Guest users register for the service with a phone number to receive SMS messages and/or an email address to receive a password to connect to the network.

Guests will be provided access to one device for 12 hours (with the option to renew).

Connecting via Windows 8 or higher

1. Click on the Network icon located at the bottom right corner of the task bar.
2. Click on the CI_GUEST network from the list of available networks.
3. Click on Connect. If you want to connect automatically to this network in the future, check the box next to Connect automatically.
4. The network status Connected will appear.
5. Open a web browser to register and login to the CI_GUEST wireless network.

Connecting via Mac OS version 10.8.5 or higher

1. Click the Wi-Fi icon on the menu toolbar and select Turn Wi-Fi On.
2. Select CI_GUEST network from the list of available networks.
3. Open a web browser to register and login to the CI_GUEST wireless network.

Connecting via a Mobile Device

1. Click on the Wi-Fi Settings for your mobile device and select the CI_GUEST network.
2. Open a web browser to register and login to the CI_GUEST wireless network.



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
